## PLANS FOR INTERCEPTING SEWER SYSTEM

### Taxpayers Will Be Asked to Vote \$40,000 for This Purpose at Charter Election.

The prime matter of importance to come before the taxpayers at the charter election next Tuesday, is the question of raising \$40,000 for an intercepting sewer and disposal plant, the amount to be raised by bonds payable in thirty annual installments.

The action at this time is because of the position taken by the State Health Department, which refuses to sanction the discharge of sewage into the barge canal. Practically all the drainage of the South Side has heretofore been emptied into the Erie canal, and that from the North Side into Thomas creek. This has also been prohibited by the State Health Department.

To meet this condition and care for the sewage on both sides of the village, the village authorities and village engineer have perfected a plan providing for an intercepting sewer, taking the sewage from both the North Side and South Side trunk sewers and carrying it to a point in the western part of the village where a disposal plant will be located. This plan has the sanction of State Commissioner Porter.

The plan provides for carrying the South Main street trunk sewer across West avenue and along the south bank of the canal to a point about opposite

Bearsley street, where it would cross under the barge canal. The North Main street sewer would either be carried down Parce avenue or brought to Canal street where it would be carried west along the canal until it intersected the sewer which had been carried under the canal and then one trunk line would be carried north and west to a disposal plant in the western part of the town. This disposal plant would also provide for a storm overflow, so that the present sewer system as now in use could be utilized.

It is estimated that this work can be done for a sum not to exceed \$40,000 and if this amount is voted, bonds will be issued payable in thirty annual installments. This would necessitate the raising of only \$1,333 and interest, a total of something like \$3,300 the first year and a less amount each succeeding year, an amount so small that it would scarcely be felt by the taxpayers.

The village trustees have called a public meeting for this evening, in the Town hall, where the plans will be fully explained, all questions answered and a free discussion invited. Everybody interested is invited and the women taxpayers are especially urged to be present, as they are privileged to vote on this question.

### FOUND MISSING BROTHER.

**Murphy Brothers Reunited After Thirty-two Years—Now Have Fortune.**

W. A. Murphy of Lebanon, N. Y., arrived in Cuba looking for a brother, Darby Murphy, whom he had not seen for thirty-two years. He found him working at the Cuba Hotel for E. O. Prouty.

There are three of the Murphy brothers, the third being a professor in St. John's College, New York. They are cousins of Charles F. Murphy, the Tammany Hall leader.

Two aunts who recently died in Dublin, Ireland, left an estate valued at about \$2,000,000, to which these three brothers are the only heirs.

The Murphys were originally from Fairport, N. Y., where their father was a well-to-do farmer. A dispute over the father's property caused Darby to leave home, and for thirty-two years he has had no communication with his brothers. The matter of the Dublin legacy caused W. A. Murphy to look up Darby whom he found as above described.

Darby Murphy left Tuesday to accompany his brother to his home in Lebanon, Madison county. His brother wanted to fit Darby out with a new suit of clothes, but Darby said he had always worn overalls since he had been in Cuba and he did not want a new suit until he got to Rochester. When he reached there he was willing to clean up and put on new clothes.—Cuba, N. Y., Patriot.

### SHAW'S HALL SOLD.

**Charles W. Aldrich Purchases Landmark and Will Make Alterations.**

Charles W. Aldrich, who has conducted the Bijou Dream in the Shaw block for several years past, has purchased the building and will make extensive alterations and improvements to the same in the near future.

The original building will be moved back to the rear of the lot and an up-to-date brick and plate glass front will be put in even with the street line, greatly improving the appearance and general usefulness of the building.

The stores on either side of the main entrance will also be remodeled and improved giving better facilities to the occupants of the lower part of the building. It is expected that the present tenants will remain.
